From the Chairman

I was absent from the last (July) quarterly meeting as I was at the Ringing World National Youth Contest where Melissa and Jonathan were both in the Bedfordshire band. The Bedfordshire band made it through the qualifier at Yardley in the morning to join five others in the final at St Paul's, Birmingham in the afternoon. They were however unable to defend the Whitechapel Trophy, finishing joint second in the methods section and joint third overall. The method and overall winners were Yorkshire Tykes. The day is more than just the contest with chances for our ringers to ring at Solihull, Aston, St Chad's and the sixteen at St Martin's in the Bullring as well as on handbells and the Ambergate and Charmborough mini-rings. Also a chance to meet with other young ringers from all over the country.

Unfortunately we were unable to form a District team to enter in the Melville Cup, the young ringers' striking contest held annually between the three Association Districts. The young ringers from our District who were able to attend at Clifton for the contest and subsequent general young ringers' practice did form part of the scratch band that rang the second best test piece on the day. Luton District were the winners.

Our Annual District Meeting comes around in January. It is at this meeting that we elect the officers to serve the District for the year and other members for the District Committee. The elected positions are Ringing Master, Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and BRF Treasurer (also currently serves as R J Sharp and Association BRF representative). Independent examiners for the District accounts and BRF accounts are also elected. Candidates are welcome.

Report of Bedford Quarterly District Meeting on 1 July 2017

Sarah Ward opened the meeting at St Mary's Felmersham by explaining that Chairman Alex Nash was with his family at the Ringing World National Youth Contest in Birmingham.

There were no deceased members reported. Stephen Stanford said that the ropes for Elstow had now been ordered with an expected delivery of six weeks. Sarah thanked Ian and Anna Townsend for organising the Little Bob Minor training session at Kempston on 6 May. The BRF was £18,229.76, an application had been received from Kempston for a grant of £5,000 towards their project (see article at the back of this Headstock). There were no new members. Recent and future events were discussed.

Tim Blunt had been elected Association Treasurer at the AGM, so Andrew Dennison was elected to replace him as Independent Examiner of the District accounts. The "3rd Monday" practices at St Paul's Bedford were discussed. Maureen Hall suggested that the District BRF Rules should be available on the Association website.

Sarah thanked the Vicar and Churchwardens of Sharnbrook and Felmersham for use of the bells and facilities.

Miriam Clark

Miriam, a very longstanding ringer at Elstow, died on 21 August 2017 and her funeral took place at Elstow Abbey on 26 September.

An article appeared in the January 2016 Headstock about the party held on 21 June 2015 to celebrate her 89th birthday on 15 June of that year and to congratulate her on her 50 years as Tower Captain at Elstow. On to the lovely village of Wicken where the village fete was taking place. Wicken's tower captain, Andrew Spencer, was in charge and this was the only ring of eight for the day. (Unfortunately, other eights I had planned had not been available on the day). This gave everyone a chance to up the level by ringing some very good eight-bell methods.

Afternoon tea was taken at the ARTea Room at Wakefield Country Courtyard – a small collection of bespoke shops which everyone enjoyed looking round.

Alex Nash looked after Potterspury which was our penultimate tower, a nice ground floor ring then on to the final tower, Blisworth also ground floor where Chris Hartley took charge.

The outing finished up in the Royal Oak in Blisworth for a well-earned meal and drink.

Tailenders' Report 2017



Our July meeting was in Eaton The eight bells Socon. are rather lovely and there was some good ringing. We rang rounds and call changes as well as a touch of Grandsire triples and plain courses of Plain Bob maior and triples, Stedman triples and Cambridge major. Even the ringing down was very good.

Lunch was just along the road at the Wagon and Horses. We had not ordered our meals in advance but the service was good and everyone thoroughly enjoyed their meals from the seniors' two course menu deal. Many thanks to Humphrey for arranging everything so well.

Our August meeting was meant to be a summery two tower meeting in Cambridgeshire but unfortunately the weather was against us.

Our first tower, in the delightful village of **Barrington**, was a ground floor ring of six and they went beautifully. We went straight from ringing up into a short touch of Grandsire doubles. This set the standard for the visit and we rang touches of Plain Bob doubles, more Grandsire doubles, a plain course of Cambridge minor and rounds and call changes. The final touch of Stedman doubles



was followed by a good lower. We were grateful to be allowed to ring there as the church is closed while extensive renovations are carried out to the nave floor and north wall.

Lunch was at The Little Rose in Haslingfield. We were the only customers there and the food was very good with large portions. Unfortunately the small staff had difficulty in getting our meals to us all at the same time and the last meals arrived after some people had

completely finished. This wasn't the end of the world as we were not due at the next tower until 2 o'clock.



We arrived at **Barton** in good time and were let in and shown the steps to the tower. Because of insurance, there is a maximum of 12 people allowed in the ringing chamber at any one time but we organised ourselves to comply with this. The bells are not easy to ring well as there is terrific tower movement during ringing and a few bells were dropping quite

badly. Some people felt so nauseous they had to go down to the main body of the church to recover. Despite this we rang touches of Grandsire doubles and Plain Bob doubles and minor before ringing down.

As we came out of the church at 3 o'clock the sun made a brief appearance before we drove home in the steady rain. Many thanks to Lynn and Martin Goodwin for organising an interesting and different pair of churches and for arranging the lunch.

Our September meeting was in the pretty village of **Haynes**. The weather was lovely, crisp and autumnal. The bells are a light ground floor six which go well, but we didn't do them justice.

We rang Plain Bob doubles and minor, Cambridge minor, and rounds and call changes but some ringers found the light bells challenging.



Barbara organised tea or coffee for anyone who wanted them and this was much appreciated.

Derek led a minute's silence while we remembered Miriam Clark from Elstow, one of the original Tailenders, who died a few days earlier. She will be much missed.

Lunch was at The Greyhound, a few minutes away in the edges of Haynes. There was a wide selection of beers and the meals were excellent. We were served quickly and good food was presented imaginatively. Many thanks go to Barbara B. for organising everything so well.

St Peter's Cup - Association Six Bell Striking Competition

The Association six bell striking competition hosted by the Bedford District was held on 16 September at St Denys Colmworth. The church has a groundfloor 9 cwt ring and the bells go very well. Usually six teams take part, that is two from each District, but unfortunately this year Dunstable could not raise a team so they rang as a "scratch" band and therefore were not placed.

It was a very cold and wet day, which made it rather uncomfortable to go outside to listen to the ringing. The judges were Chris and Ruth Stokes who ring at Cosgrove in South Northamptonshire.

Kempston Bells Appeal

There is a long tradition of maintaining and improving the bells at Kempston dating back to the 1400s. We have some excellent bells at All Saints but two of the bells, the tenor (~17½cwt) and the 7th bell (~9½cwt) are thin and now very old (1603 and 1633 respectively) and would probably not survive any attempt to tune them more accurately.

The ringers have been given a very rare offer of two excellent 1910 Taylors bells from the Keltek Trust, which originate from Prinknash Abbey in Gloucestershire; these will replace the existing 7th and tenor bells which will be hung dead above the remaining bells.

This project, along with supporting works and clapper refurbishment, will make the Kempston bells one of the best peals in the county and, at the same time preserve the two 17th century bells for use as service and funeral bells, thus retaining an important link with ringing at Kempston going back to the time of Elizabeth I.

The total cost of the project stands at £45,000 and completes the work started from the 1976 project, with a larger pit specifically left for a tenor bell of the correct size (and weight).

At this point we would like to thank the district for the generous donation of £5000 that has helped us to launch the appeal.

History of the Prinknash Bells

The Prinknash Bells were originally hung in the abbey on Caldey Island in Carmarthen Bay in Pembrokeshire. The current abbey was built in 1910 by Anglican Benedictine monks and a peal of eight bells, cast by Messrs Taylor and Co, Loughborough, were installed. The bells were used during festivals to help with the due observance of discipline and to punctuate the monastic routine. They were also rung for great occasions such as the end of World War II.

The community moved to Prinknash Abbey Gloucestershire in 1928. An agreement was reached whereby the Cistercian monks who took up residence at Caldey Island retained two of the bells and supplied replacements. These were also cast by Taylors of Loughborough and designed to match the exact tonal character of the originals. In 1931 when the eight bells reached Prinknash Park they were fixed in a frame in the East Court. In 1975 the bells were moved to a newly-built abbey. They were last rung in 2008, when the community moved to St Peter's Grange.

The Prinknash Abbey bells are of a very high quality and from a period when Taylors were casting some of their best bells; this (1896 through to the late 1950s) being considered something of a 'magic' era. Bedfordshire rings cast by Taylors during this period include the magnificently sounding octaves at Bromham (1907), Cardington (1900), and St Paul's Bedford (1896-1945).

Originally included in an auction run by Chorley's, Prinknash (May 2015), the eight Abbey bells failed to sell. The Keltek Trust then acquired the bells with the sole purpose of rehoming them for full-circle ringing. Currently all of the bells are to be rehomed (subject to faculties) between Lichfield St Chad, Laxfield (Suffolk) and All Saints Kempston. This is no surprise given the quality of these bells and the fact that they have never been rung for full circle ringing – so can be considered "as new"!
